




Singapore General Hospital: Saving Lives in the Course of Singapore's History

The Bowyer Block in the Singapore General Hospital (SGH) was gazetted as a National Monument in 2009 to recognise its contributions to public healthcare in Singapore. Over almost 200 years, healthcare workers have dedicated themselves to serving victims of tragedies that took place in Singapore's history. 1. B____ H_ S___ fire in 1961



he fire occurred on 25 May 1961 over the Hari Raya public holiday. It destroyed 100 acres of attap houses, factories, shops, timber yards and even a school. It caused some 16,000 kampong dwellers to be homeless and four died. The Singapore General Hospital treated more than 200 cases in the first six hours!

2. Spyros Oil T____ in 1978

The Spyros disaster was a major industrial disaster that occurred in Singapore on 12 October 1978, where the Greek oil tanker Spyros exploded at Jurong Shipyard, killing 76 people and injuring 69 others. As a result of this incident, the Burns Unit was developed at SGH to treat burns victims.

3. Collapse of Hotel

The hotel collapsed on 15 March 1986 and was considered one of the worst disasters in post-war Singapore. 33 people died and 17 were rescued from the rubble. The helipad atop Block 1 at SGH was instrumental in aiding the transfer of victims quickly from the accident site to the hospital.
